Family is a shared experience of respect, love and loyalty!



The Appalachian Pregnancy Care Center provides a program called "Earn While You Learn." This program has

many different modules and curriculum that takes place while clients learn about bringing life into the world. It provides material needs to help new mothers prepare for baby's homecoming and helps clients "earn" what they buy through learning while participating in the program.

The APCC client meets weekly with the same advocate, which helps develop a meaningful relationship.

The program also offers a Bible study, which deepens and expands our client's understanding of specific Bible passages.

It helps clients sort through hard concepts and gives insight into the context of the Bible. Ideally, our Earn While You Learn Bible study helps meet the spiritual needs of the women we serve.

There is nothing more adrenaline-producing for APCC staff than to share the story of Jesus Christ in our conversations with women facing a pregnancy crisis.


Pike County students lend a helping hand
