
Eastern Kentucky suffered unfathomable damages from recent flooding, including the loss of 39 lives and damage and destruction to hundreds of properties.

Very often, they do not want to end their pregnancy, but they have a tough time seeing any alternatives to abortion. More women today are learning about options other than abortion, and one of the best places to learn is at APCC.

APCC is devoted to helping women and young girls make informed choices by providing a range of services to support them throughout their pregnancy and beyond. We see a tremendous number of women in Eastern Kentucky choosing life for their children. APCC specializes in networking, gathering information, and developing relationships with a variety of community organizations. Some of those additional services include cooperating with the Women and Infant Children (WIC) program to get food into a pregnant woman's home, working with health service agencies to make sure she has everything she needs for ongoing care, contacting government agencies to make sure she is signed up for any help she qualifies for, working with hospitals to provide labor and birthing classes on-site at the center, the East Kentucky Strong program through County Schools, Mountain Comprehensive Care Center's Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program, as well as other programs and services.

When you walk into APCC, you will experience warmth, kindness, and compassion, both from the staff and volunteers. We are specialists in bringing care, comfort, and practical solutions. We listen and learn about a woman's situation, walk her through her options and empower her to make decisions.

APCC provides classes and ongoing support systems. We are in it with her for the long haul.

We are so encouraged by the faithfulness of our partners in prayer, support, and giving.

We trust that God will continue to supply our needs as we move forward at APCC and as we celebrate life and the overturning of Roe v. Wade by the Supreme Court, ending 50 years of federal abortion rights.

New location will help APCC expand services offered in three states

The Appalachian Pregnancy Care Center officially cut the ribbon on its new expanded facility on April 19, and we are so excited as to what this new facility can offer our region.

Our new home has been a dream of APCC for as long as we can remember!

The center's previous location was 193 Main Street, and is now located at 118 Loraine Street in Pikeville.

APCC offers pregnancy testing, adoption education, baby, and maternity resources, counseling sessions, parenting and life skills and nutrition classes, among other services.

The new location will allow APCC to expand services to meet the needs of more families and women in its 18-county service region, which includes 14 counties in Kentucky, two counties in West Virginia and two counties in Virginia

APCC has been looking for a new location for quite some time, but never dreamed that we would be able to afford something as grand and beautiful as our new home at 118 Loraine Street. We just feel thankful and grateful for all our communities and churches for making this new facility possible.

The center's hours are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays, and 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Wednesdays. The center is closed on Mondays, Saturdays, and Sundays.

APCC Helps Chaney Family Pick up the Pieces

On June 28, when I kissed my family goodbye as I went out the door for work, the thought never crossed my mind that by morning I wouldn't have a home to come back to.

My shift at McDowell ARH, where I was working as a traveling nurse at the time, started as normally as any other. I had a full patient load, as did the other nurses, so, naturally, our only thoughts were about caring for our patients in a timely fashion.

It was after midnight before I sat down to take a break and catch up on my charting for the night. Around 1 a.m., weather alerts started to go off on our phones. You could hear them one-by-one, as each nurse had a different location programmed into their phone. The alert on mine was for a flash flood warning, so I immediately called home. We live right on the banks of Elkhorn Creek. My husband calmly assured me that the water levels had not exceeded the banks and that everything was fine. He promised to keep watch, as it was still raining heavily, with no relief in the forecast.

Within a half hour, he let me know the waters had risen and were pooling under the backside of our home. He had gotten all our children out of bed and was headed to slightly higher ground, next door at my grandma's.

Within a half hour, as the waters drastically rose, they were all forced off the property and onto a hillside in our Dodge Ram truck.

The waters inched toward the top of the road, just feet away from my family, and, unfortunately, they became trapped. The road to the left was claimed by the roaring waters, and the road to the right was taken by the waters and landslides of a hillside.

With nowhere to go, they sat and prayed for over nine hours, watching the raging waters unapologetically ravage their home, as all they have ever known washed downstream.

Frantic, I told my supervisor that I had to leave work. She was concerned about me traveling in the current conditions, but reluctantly let me go. By the time I made it downstairs, people were congregating around the exit doors, so I quickly parted through them, only to find our parking lot under water. We were stranded. I sank to the ground as the realization hit me that I would not see my children and family until Mother Nature relented.

I called them numerous times, but cell reception was patchy. To hear them crying, asking me when they would see me and begging me to come home, was unbearable. It was truly a mother's worst nightmare!

When I gathered my composure, I went back inside to care for the patients upstairs, as dayshift could not get in and nightshift could not get out.

Sometime in the afternoon, the waters receded, allowing a few day-shifters to trickle in and freeing us up to finally end our shifts. Unfortunately, for the ones of us who had not driven fourwheel drive vehicles to work, we had to wait for either alternate transportation or the roads to be repaired.

By the time my husband got there to pick me up, I was so worn out that I was physically sick. Sleep was nowhere in our near future. When we arrived home, my children were waiting for me in our driveway and wasted no When I looked up,

time running into my arms. I held them tight and honestly never wanted to let them go.

never wanted to let them go. When I looked up, I could not believe my eyes. Everything was encased in a capsule of mud. The smell of stagnant, muddy water filled my nose with every breath. Our feet suctioned to the ground, and, with every step, the mud fought to pull the shoes off our feet. Then, there was my home, completely off its foundation, sitting on the ground with other people's possessions, trees, and trash clinging to the sides. We wept — all thankful to be alive, but also in mourning for our home.

It was devastating to see, and for the children to have so many questions that I could not find the answers to. In the days to come, we tried to salvage what little we could, which was not much. Being in my second trimester of pregnancy at the time, we had already gotten over half of our son's things that

we would need for his nursery, and we salvaged none of that.

If not for our wonderful local churches and community organizations, we would have nothing.

The Appalachian Pregnancy Care Center is among these amazing people who have blessed us beyond measure. They have helped us to replace my lost maternity clothes, my newborn outfits, diapers, wipes, and have also been a shoulder to lean on.

I look forward to each monthly visit, and I know if I need them in between our visits that I can always call on them. It is always so uplifting and inviting to be inside their doors, no matter what we have going on. They talk with me, pray with me, and give amazing advice to help us with our situation.

The women who devote their time there are truly blessings, and I am extremely thankful for each one of them I do not know

Many people ask how the Appalachian Pregnancy Care Center is funded.

To date, the APCC has received no government funding. It is completely dependent on donor support.

Our supporters are vital, as we are 100 percent supported by the generosity of our communities! We have been an organization for 15 years and our donors have never let us down!

Naturally, there is a strong relationship between pregnancy resource centers and the faith community. Although APCC is not formally tied to a particular church, the bulk of our support — including

volunteers and donors — comes from the people in the pews!

APCC has helped empower more than 8,000 women, and we are seeing changes — negative patterns that occur in their families for (in many cases) generations.

They say, "I am going to break this pattern and create new legacies for my children."

So, if you ask APCC what is the most important thing we need, it is funding. While all donations at any time are welcome, regular ones are especially needed.

We need regular, reliable support to develop our budget.

A lot of moms tell us that everything they have to care for their baby came directly from us. They do not get baby showers. The people in their life are pushing toward abortion.

Without our wonderful donors, we could not operate properly! We are serving more clients than ever before, which is one of the reasons we purchased our new larger facility.

Even though we live in poor economic times, the APPC must continue serve our hurting population, which is why we need your support now more than ever!

Advertising has three primary objectives: To inform, to persuade, and to remind.


