Alexandria (Alex to family and friends) is a 19 year old sophomore at UPIKE. She chose to volunteer at APCC as part of the preparation for the pageant. "Katina Justice, pageant director, suggested I volunteer at APCC in order to develop a platform for competition," stated Alex. "I came to APCC thinking I might like it, but now I know I want to continue volunteering here!"

Alex's platform for the pageant, "Appalachian Pregnancy Care Center: Small Change Makes a Big Difference" highlighted APCC's basic philosophy of how the center is funded. Every penny, nickel, dime or quarter given in any of APCC's various fund drives, such as the Baby Bottle Drive, adds up to assis-

tance for women experiencing unplanned pregnancies.

Alex is an elementary education major from Paintsville, Ky. After graduation she plans to return to Johnson County and teach. Alex attends UPIKE on a soccer scholarship and is an active member of Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Along with her parents, Dexter and Janie Allen, Alex attends Southside Freewill Baptist Church where she has been a member of the youth group for eight years.

Alex explained that the pageant was a totally new experience. She stated, "Though I did not place this year, I'm looking forward to next year. I've learned that when you set your mind to do something you really want, anything is possible!"

"The staff and I at APCC are so very proud of Alex," commented APCC director Kay Hammond. "We are grateful she chose to cham-

#### All About Us

The Appalachian Pregnancy Care Center provides a much-needed pregnancy counseling service to our region. Our center is located at 193 Main Street in Pikeville and was established to offer services and support for women, teens and families facing the uncertainty of unplanned pregnancies. By making help and services available to those who need it, coupled with a sense of care and compassion, the center aims to offer a viable alternative to abortion.

This year's "Baby Bottle Brigade" was enormously successful. Along with contributions from churches, organizations, businesses and individu—als, the drive yielded approximately \$44,000 to be used by the center for many of its monthly expenses and other activities conducted for our clients.

To date, the center has served 343 clients and has had over 100 babies born under the blanket of APCC.


comed me with open arms. I was very pleased and immediately became comfortable. Not only am I doing my work study at the Appalachian Pregnancy Care Center, I am also a client.

## The Choice of a Lifetime



his time of year, there is a lot of football playing on the TV at our house. I confess that football is not one of my favorite ways of passing time; however, I do pay attention when I hear the name 'Tim Tebow'. Tebow was a first round NFL draft pick in 2010, winner of two NCAA national football championships, the first-ever sophomore to win the Heisman Trophy, winner of the Davey O'Brien award as the nation's best college quarterback, two-time winner of the Maxwell Award as the nation's top college football player, and winner of the Sullivan award as the nation's most outstanding amateur athlete in any sport. All of these prestigious accolades are remarkable to football fans, but what impresses me is the young man's personal story. Medical doctors attending Tim's mother, while she was pregnant with Tim, predicted that Tim would face serious birth complications ensuing in life threatening birth defects; their recommendation was that Tim be aborted. Proclaiming her faith in Jesus Christ, Tim's mother refused the abortion. In spite of the dismal predictions of a "defective" life, Tim was born and grew to be strong and healthy. By refusing an abortion, Tim's mother-along with God's grace-produced one of the most outstanding athletes of our time.

# **Doula** Joins Volunteer Staff of Appalachian Pregnancy Care Center



APCC is excited to announce the addition of a certified doula to its volunteer staff. Doula is a Greek word for a woman

who serves or takes care of another woman.

As an APCC volunteer, Cristin Stanley-Potter will be serving clients as both a birth doula and postpartum doula. She is trained and certified by Childbirth and Postpartum Professional Association (CAPPA).

APCC director, Kay Hammond, commented, "Our organization will be substantially enhanced in its ability to help prepare young women for the birth of their child through the services of a certified doula. Cristin's decision to work with our clients is exactly what APCC needs at this time."

As a birth doula, Cristin is trained to offer both emotional and physical support during and directly after birth. She will help with and give advice on comfort measures such as breathing techniques, relaxation, and massage.

Cristin states, "Expectant mothers often have many unanswered questions and feelings of anxiousness. It will be my job to ease their worries by helping them learn what they can expect before, during, and immediately after giving birth. As the mother of two, I know from experience that child birth can be quite frightening for any mother, but particularly for the first time mother who really doesn't know what to expect."

As a doula trained by CAP-PA, Cristin is not allowed or qualified to give specific medical advice. However, in her work at APCC, she will be offering one-on-one classes for expectant mothers in which she will discuss various issues such as the different medications used, what a "C" section involves, and other aspects of giving birth. Her goal is for expectant mothers to understand they can and should make their own decisions about birthing their baby.

Research has shown that mothers who had the assistance of a doula usually were:

- More confident with their baby
- Less anxious and depressed
- More satisfied with their partner
- More likely to breastfeed

Cristin is adamant about the positive effects of breastfeeding. Her training as a post-partum doula allows her to assist new mothers in learning about and becoming comfortable with breastfeeding.

Cristin states, "Having someone there to provide information and emotional support can always make things easier for expectant mothers.

It is my calling to be that person for any mother, first time or fourth time. I am thrilled beyond words to offer my assistance to APCC and to be working for such a worthwhile and needed organization."

A 2007 graduate of Belfry High School, Cristin is married to a fireman and the mother of a nineteen-month -old toddler and a six-weekold baby. Of course, Cristin has chosen to breastfeed with both children.


Presently, Cristin is unable to be with mothers as they deliver their babies due to having her own baby which would make scheduling hard. However, she is available for individual instruction/counseling with expectant mothers and their partners as they prepare for their baby's birth. She is also available to assist new mothers with developing and continuing successful breastfeeding techniques.
